CADASTRAL SURVEYORS LICENSING BOARD OF NEW ZEALAND

Summary

The challenges facing surveyors and property owners in defining boundaries affected by earthquake-induced land movement have taken a considerable amount of the Board's time this year. Firstly, considering and understanding the Bill that led to the Canterbury Property Boundaries and Related Matters Act 2016 has been an important focus. The Board has been pleased to see the Surveyor-General and the surveying profession working together to develop a coherent and practical response to this problem.

Canterbury land movement has also led to complaints brought to the Board about the correct definition of boundaries, which has also led to consideration of whether a Building Location Certification and some other similar types of surveys come within the definition of a cadastral survey in the Cadastral Survey Act 2002.

The Board hosted the Council for Reciprocating Boards of Australia and New Zealand (CRSBANZ) in conjunction with the FIG Working Week and New Zealand Institute of Surveyors (NZIS) annual conference held in Christchurch in May. The Board is pleased to see that CRSBANZ is focusing on improving the understanding of the various standards that surveyors need to follow and achieve to be granted a licence to conduct Cadastral Surveys across the different Australian States and New Zealand. There was also an agreement to set up a panel to review the university courses for surveying degrees to ensure they all meet CRSBANZ requirements.

The licence renewal process continues to pose some challenges as the Board is maintaining its scrutiny of applications for renewal. The Board conducted one interview with a surveyor to confirm that the Board's standards were met. The Board will continue to investigate on-line renewal to make the process easier for surveyors and more cost effective for the Board. In the meantime the Board's website and document security have been updated and improved.

The Board is pleased to see that the number of licences issued during the year is higher again this year, showing that the profession and the Board's licensing regime are capable of responding to market demand.

Jurisdiction

The Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand is constituted by section 10 of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002.

Functions

The functions and duties undertaken by the Board are set out in section 11 of the Cadastral Survey Act. (See Appendix A).

In summary, the primary function of the Board is the licensing of suitably qualified surveyors with current competence to conduct cadastral surveys and lodge them in the cadastral record. For this purpose, the Board sets standards for the education and the practical experience required to obtain and retain a cadastral licence.

The Board exercises disciplinary powers in cases where a cadastral surveyor is charged with negligence, incompetence, falsification, or failure to observe the Rules for Cadastral Survey. The Board has the authority to suspend or cancel a licence, or place a surveyor under the supervision of another licensed cadastral surveyor, where professional misconduct is proven.

Licences are renewed annually.

In addition, the Board participates in reciprocity arrangements with the eight Australian State and Territory boards.

Membership

Under section 13 of the Act there are five board members appointed by the Minister of Land Information.

The Board members as at 30 June 2016 were:

- Mr Brett Douglas Gawn and Ms Vicki Alma Nalder, appointed as nominees of bodies representing licensed cadastral surveyors pursuant to section 13(2)(a);
- Ms Merryn Kay Maguire and Mr Anthony Paul Nikkel appointed pursuant to section 13(2)(b);
- Ms Marion Grace Miller, being a person who is not and never has been a licensed cadastral surveyor and is not employed in the surveying profession is appointed pursuant to section 13(2)(c);
- Surveyor-General, Mark Dyer, as an *ex-officio* member of the Board pursuant to section 13(1)(b);
- Mr Neale Charles Thomas Faulkner is a substitute member of the Board.

The current three year term for Board members has expired and the Minister is currently considering candidates for the next term. The existing members continue serving until the new Board is gazetted. There will be at least one new member as Mr Gawn is not seeking reappointment after serving 17 years as a Board member.

Meetings

The Board met four times in the 2015/16 year, on:

13 August 2015
3 December 2015
25 February 2016
10 June 2016.

Teleconferences were held on 30 September 2015 and 6 November 2015.

Licences

The table below shows the number of licences issued over the last five years. In the table:

- “Renewed” means the number of licenses renewed at 30 June 2015.
- “New” means the number of initial licenses issued during the year.
- “Re-applied” means the number of licenses issued to surveyors who failed to renew by 30 of June 2015 or had let their licence lapse for some time.
- “Non-renewals” means surveyors who chose not to renew their licenses and deceased surveyors.

The continuing increase in the number of licences issued is encouraging, especially the increase in first time applicants that is at its highest level in five years. The Board expects

that the number of surveyors holding a licence to keep rising over the next few years as demand for cadastral surveyors increases.

The following tables show surveyors by age group, gender, and ethnicity.

The number of women has increased from the 43 women in 2011, but the number of Maori is still very small. The Board would like to see increased gender and ethnic diversity in the profession in the future and urges the profession to continue its efforts to achieve that.

The Board issued Letters of Accreditation to two New Zealand surveyors seeking registration in Australian States, compared with five last year. This continues the downward trend in recent years in response to increased demand in New Zealand. The Board also approved three licence applications from surveyors returning from Australia.

There has been an increase in the number of enquiries from overseas surveyors about becoming licensed in New Zealand.

This year the Board recognised surveying degrees from Poland, China, Czech Republic, United Kingdom, Iran and Sri Lanka as meeting its academic standards for licensing. In most cases when applicants present surveying degrees from countries other than New Zealand or Australia these degrees are assessed by the Bureau of Assessment of Overseas Qualifications to establish if they met the Board's standards for licensing. Since 2002, the Bureau has also assessed degrees from France, Greece, Mauritius, Philippines, South Africa (Natal), and USA (Minnesota) as meeting its Standards and being equivalent to a four year surveying degree in New Zealand or Australia.

Discipline

The Board received two complaints that were within its jurisdiction relating to the misconduct of other surveyors. Both complaints were made by a cadastral surveyor and were fully investigated by the Board and subsequently declined in terms of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002. The Board also completed its consideration of another complaint (made by the Surveyor-General) that had been received in the previous financial year, resulting in its withdrawal.

There were no complaints from members of the public or from the Surveyor-General, although the outcome of one complaint from the Surveyor-General continued to be managed by the Board during this period.

The Surveyor-General advised the Board of nine notices of a significant failure to comply with his standards in accordance with section 7(1)(d) of the Act during the year, compared to 15 in 2014/15 and 18 in 2013/14. The Board monitors the surveyors who have been notified

to the Board under this section in the previous three years. As part of this monitoring, the Board takes a more in-depth review of these surveyors on a case by case basis before deciding whether to renew their licences. In some cases, the Board has asked applicants for additional information to confirm their competency before renewing their licence and conducted one interview with a renewal applicant during the period.

Licensing Standards

The Board recognises the admissions interviews conducted by the NZIS as evidence that applicants for initial licences meet the standards of competencies adopted by the Board. The Board monitors the conduct of these examinations and is currently working with NZIS to promote a broader focus on the examination of professional behaviour and ethics to reflect modern professional practice.

The Board fully encourages the face to face professional examinations, supported by documented experience certified by existing licensed cadastral surveyors.

The National School of Surveying at the University of Otago, is the only university in New Zealand that offers degrees in surveying and the Board monitors its curriculum from time to time. The School's Advisory Board, of which the Chair is a member, has not met in the last two years.

Reciprocity

Reciprocity between the New Zealand and Australian surveyors' boards has existed in some form since 1892. The Board collaborates closely with the Australian boards on the assessment of other overseas qualifications for equivalence to the New Zealand and Australian degrees and setting policies for the education, training, and regulation of surveyors.

Contact with the Australian States' boards is maintained through the CRSBANZ that comprises of the Chairs of each board. Meetings of the CRSBANZ are generally held once per year, however this year two meetings and one teleconference were held. The most recent meeting was hosted by the Board in Christchurch on 2 May 2016, in conjunction with the NZIS and FIG Conference.

CRSBANZ has recently resolved to work at developing a set of guidelines for licensing, and to establish a panel to review the accreditation of university degrees to ensure they meet the required academic standards for licensing. The outcomes of this work will assist the Board to continue to work with NZIS to ensure their examinations remain reflective of modern survey practice.

The activities of CRSBANZ are of significant value to New Zealand surveyors, and promote closer economic relations between Australia and New Zealand.

Finance

The Board is funded entirely by licensing fees gathered annually from licenced cadastral surveyors. The level of those fees is set by the Board under section 11(1)(c) of the Act. The Board closely reviews its operating costs and continually seeks ways to ensure it works efficiently. The increase in scrutiny on applicants for renewal, and the time spent on its review of the Canterbury Property Boundaries and Related Matters Act 2016 has required a small increase to the licence fee from \$194 to \$207 for the 2016/17 year to maintain the Boards financial position.

Administration

The Board continues to contract the Institute of Professional Engineers New Zealand (IPENZ) to provide administrative and accounting services, office facilities, and meeting rooms. IPENZ maintains full time office hours, dedicated telephone and email point of contact, and hosts the Board's website. This is considered to be a very valuable arrangement for the Board.

Mr Robert Buchanan of Wellington acts as the Board's legal adviser, and Mr Phil Napper is contracted as the Board Secretary.

The functions and duties of the board, as set out in section 11 of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002 are:

- (a) To maintain a register of cadastral surveyors licensed under this Act.
- (b) To receive applications for licences under this Act as cadastral surveyors and to issue licences in proper cases.
- (c) To set fees for the issue and renewal of licences under this Act.
- (d) To issue and update standards that persons applying for licences, or the renewal of licences, under this Act must meet.
- (e) To investigate complaints about cadastral surveyors and take disciplinary action in appropriate cases under this Act.
- (f) To provide statistical information to the Minister about cadastral surveyors as requested by the Minister.
- (g) To perform such other functions or duties conferred on it by this Act or any other enactment.

ENTITY INFORMATION

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand is a Body Corporate constituted by and operating under the Cadastral Survey Act 2002 (the Act).

The functions of the Board are set out in section 11 of the Act, the primary function being the licensing of cadastral surveyors competent to conduct cadastral (land title) surveys. The Board consequently sets standards relating to the competencies and practical experience required for the licensing of surveyors. The Board also exercises certain disciplinary powers as set out in Part 4 and Schedule 2 of the Act.

The membership of the Board consists of:

- (a) 5 members appointed by the Minister in accordance with subsection (2) of the Act; and
- (b) the Surveyor-General.

The Board continues to contract the Institution of Professional Engineers New Zealand (IPENZ) to provide administrative services, office facilities, and meeting rooms.

The Board is funded entirely by licensing fees gathered annually from licensed cadastral surveyors. The level of those fees is set by the Board under section 11(1)(c) of the Act.

NOTES TO THE PERFORMANCE REPORT
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a. Basis of Preparation

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of less than \$2,000,000. Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand previously reported in accordance with NZ GAAP. Comparative numbers have been restated relating to reclassification of investments in the Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Cash Flows.

All transactions are reported using the accrual basis of accounting.

The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

b. Revenue

Annual licence fees for cadastral surveyors are invoiced in April of each year in advance for the following financial year. Licence fees received before 30 June that relate to the following financial year are treated as income in advance, and recognised as income in the year to which they relate.

Interest income is recognised on an accruals basis.

c. Goods & Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

d. Income Tax

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand is exempt from income tax on the basis that it falls under Section CW38 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

e. Bank and Cash

Bank and Cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances.

f. Debtors

Debtors are carried at estimated realisable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful.

2. NATURE AND ACTIVITIES OF THE BOARD

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand was established by and operates under the Cadastral Survey Act 2002. This Act requires cadastral surveys to be carried out by, or under the direction of, a licensed cadastral surveyor, who must meet the standards for competence and licensing set by the board.

3. ANNUAL CADASTRAL SURVEYORS LICENSE FEES

Cadastral Surveyors Licenses expire on 30 June each year. Applications for renewal may



be lodged at any time after 1 April for the following twelve month period commencing 1 July.

Annual subscriptions are invoiced in April each year. A number of applications for renewal are received and paid in advance during the period between 1 April and 30 June each year. These license fees received in advance are shown separately on the Statement of Financial Position and are taken up as income in the financial year to which they relate.

4. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand had no contingent liabilities as at balance date (2015 Nil).

5. COMMITMENTS

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand had no commitments as at balance date (2015 Nil).

6. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During the year Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand has had no related party transactions. No related party debts have been written off or forgiven during the year.

7. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Inland Revenue Department has revoked Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand's public authority status, which means it will no longer be tax-exempt for income tax purposes. The Board is seeking professional advice on its tax obligations going forward. At the date of approving the performance report this is still unknown.
