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CADASTRAL SURVEYORS LICENSING BOARD OF NEW ZEALAND SUMMARY

The Board has had a busy 12 months dealing with changes in its support functions, the licensing renewal process, overseas enquiries about licensing in New Zealand and enquiries from the Public on legal boundaries and surveyors.

Administration

The service agreement the Board had in place with Engineering NZ (formerly IPENZ) since 2002, to provide administrative support, financial accounts and to hold the register of Licensed Cadastral Surveyors (LCS) terminated in December 2018.

In a short period, the Board went to the market for IT and financial support. We engaged BC Systems Consultancy Ltd to manage and build a more robust system for the holding of the register. We introduced Stage 1 of an online annual licensing system and are currently developing an improved website.

For our financial accounting we engaged BakerTilly Staples Rodway in Wellington. They manage our day to day accounts, prepare the Annual Tax return and the financial reporting for Board meetings. With the change in accounting systems it has allowed more streamlining of systems and improved access to the accounts with Xero Accounting Software.

Complaints

There has been a decrease in the number of complaints against cadastral surveyors who had allegedly failed to meet the required standards for cadastral survey. However, there continues to be a relatively high number of enquiries from the public about surveyors that are outside the Board's jurisdiction. These are generally able to be referred to either Land Information New Zealand or Survey and Spatial New Zealand (formerly the NZ Institute of Surveyors).

With the new website underway, the Board will be able to provide more informative comment to the public on what matters the Board can consider with regard to Licensed Cadastral Surveyors. Frequently Asked Questions will be included on the website, based on the types of enquires we have been receiving, to better engage with the Public.

During the past 12 months the Board received the same number of significant failure notices to comply with Rules for Cadastral Survey from the office of the Surveyor General. There is still a concern that a significant proportion of surveyors do not meet first time compliance when datasets are first lodged with LINZ. However, with the introduction of the new Surveyor-Generals Rules in 2020, the Board and LINZ are looking to see improvement.

Standards

The Boards Standards continue to be reviewed to better reflect the competencies required of a modern-day cadastral surveyor and the technological advances. Also being reviewed is the process by which the Board engages Survey and Spatial New Zealand to conduct the professional examination for graduates wishing to become Licensed Cadastral Surveyors.

Licensing Numbers

This year has again seen an increase in the number of licenses being issued. For the Board, the continuance of graduates wanting to become Licensed Cadastral Surveyors is fundamental to guaranteed titles and land ownership in NZ. Apart from a short period during the GFC, Professional Surveying practices in NZ have and still struggle to fill the vacancies for graduate and licensed cadastral surveyors in NZ.

The challenge for the surveying profession is to recruit competent qualified staff, and if this is not the case then it will pose a “risk” to the integrity of the cadastre in NZ. Competent staff in turn can be linked to the numbers of students graduating from the Otago Survey School to becoming Licensed Cadastral Surveyors and staying in NZ to work.

There has also been an increase in the number of surveyors with overseas qualifications coming into New Zealand. Many of these surveyors are working on a pathway to eventually becoming Licensed Cadastral Surveyors.

Overseas Study

In April 2018 we were invited to participate as part of the Professional Services Recognition and Registration Study. This discussed reciprocity with Surveyors in Australia and the UK, post Brexit to see what agreements were in place and barriers to the movement of professional surveyors.

JURISDICTION

The Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand is constituted by section 10 of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002.

FUNCTIONS

The functions and duties undertaken by the Board are set out in section 11 of the Cadastral Survey Act. (See Appendix A).

In summary, the primary function of the Board is the licensing of suitably qualified surveyors with current competence to conduct cadastral surveys and lodge them in the cadastral record. For this purpose, the Board sets standards for the education and the practical experience required to obtain and retain a cadastral licence.

The Board exercises disciplinary powers in cases where a cadastral surveyor is charged with negligence, incompetence, falsification, or failure to observe the Rules for Cadastral Survey. The Board has the authority to suspend or cancel a licence or place a surveyor under the supervision of another licensed cadastral surveyor, where professional misconduct is proven.

Licenses are renewed annually.

In addition, the Board participates in reciprocity arrangements with the eight Australian State and Territory boards.

MEMBERSHIP

Under section 13 of the Act the following board members were appointed by the Minister of Land Information on 1st December 2016 for 3 year terms.

The Board members as at 30 June 2019 are:

- Mr Neale Charles Thomas Faulkner and Ms Vicki Alma Nalder, re-appointed as nominees of bodies representing licensed cadastral surveyors pursuant to section 13(2)(a);
- Ms Merryn Kay Maguire and Mr Anthony Paul Nikkel re-appointed pursuant to section 13(2)(b);
- Ms Belinda Mary Greer, being a person who is not and never has been a licensed cadastral surveyor and is not employed in the surveying profession, appointed pursuant to section 13(2)(c);
- Surveyor-General, Mark Dyer, as an *ex-officio* member of the Board pursuant to section 13(1)(b); *resigned August 2018*;
- Acting Surveyor-General , Anselm Haanen (*ex-officio* member); commenced August 2018;
- Mr Craig Kenneth McInnes appointed as a substitute member of the Board.
- Ms Adina Thorn appointed as a substitute lay member of the Board.

New appointments are expected in December 2019 for retiring members Ms Maguire, Mr Nikkel, Ms Greer and Ms Thorn.

Meetings

The Board met four times in the 2018/19 year, on:

17 August 2018

23 November 2018

22 February 2019

7 June 2019.

Two teleconferences were held; on 31 August and 5 October 2018.

Licenses

The table below shows the number of licenses issued over the last five years. In the table:

- “Renewed” means the number of licenses renewed at 30 June 2018.
- “New” means the number of initial licenses issued during the year.
- “Re-applied” means the number of licenses issued to surveyors who failed to renew by 30 of June 2018 or had let their licence lapse for some time.
- “Non-renewals” means surveyors who chose not to renew their licenses and deceased surveyors.

The continuing increase in the number of licenses issued is encouraging. The majority of new applications were from graduates of Otago University; and only 4 were from applicants with overseas qualifications.

There has also been an increase in the number of enquiries from overseas surveyors wishing to become licensed in New Zealand.

The Board expects that the number of surveyors holding a licence to keep rising steadily over the next few years as demand for cadastral surveyors is maintained.

The number of women represented continues to climb each year – an increase of 25 since 2011.

The number of Maori still remains relatively small. The Board would like to see increased gender and ethnic diversity in the profession in the future and urges the profession to continue its efforts to achieve that. It has also been noted that the recording of ethnicity in the surveying profession needs to be brought in line with NZ Practice.

The increase in the number of members in the 30-39 age group reflects some candidates choosing to delay the completion of their professional examinations post university graduation.

The Board:

- issued 1 Letter of Accreditation to a New Zealand surveyor seeking registration in Australian States (2 less than last year).
- approved 1 licence application from an Australian surveyor – (5 less than last year)
- approved 3 applications from surveyors with overseas qualifications outside Australasia.
- received 14 enquiries from overseas surveyors about becoming licensed in New Zealand (almost trebled since last year.)
- recognised surveying degrees from South Africa (6), Russia (2), Sri Lanka, Australia, Nigeria, Egypt, China and Poland as meeting its academic standards for licensing.

In cases where applicants present surveying degrees from countries, outside New Zealand or Australia, these degrees are assessed by the Bureau of Assessment of Overseas Qualifications to establish if they meet the standards of a NZ four year surveying degree. Then the overseas applicants follow the graduate path to complete their professional papers, interviews and examination to allow them to obtain a Certificate of Competency from Survey and Spatial NZ, before applying for a Licence.

DISCIPLINE

The Board received 2 complaints that were within its jurisdiction relating to the misconduct of surveyors. Both complaints were made by members of the public and were investigated by the Board. They were subsequently declined in terms of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002.

There was one complaint received from the Surveyor-General last year which was completed in this reporting year. Following full investigation and a disciplinary hearing, the surveyor was found guilty of professional misconduct in terms of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002.

There were 5 complaints about purported professional misconduct made by members of the public. The matters raised were outside the Board's jurisdiction and the complainants were directed to the appropriate authorities for assistance. As they were outside the Board's jurisdiction, they were referred to either Survey and Spatial New Zealand, Land Information NZ or, in one case, directly to the surveyors to resolve.

The Surveyor-General advised the Board of 6 notices of a significant failure to comply with his standards in accordance with section 7(1)(d) of the Act during the year, the same number as last year. The Board monitors the surveyors who have been notified to the Board under this section in the previous three years. As part of this monitoring, the Board takes a more in-depth review of these surveyors on a case by case basis before deciding whether to renew their licences. In some cases, the Board has asked applicants for additional information to confirm their competency before renewing their licence.

LICENSING STANDARDS

The Board continues to investigate what its Standards are aiming to achieve as set out under Sec 11(1)(d) of the Cadastral Survey Act. The Board sees a need for a broader statement of the objectives and outcomes of the Standards which could be modernised to take a more outcome-based approach to the competencies that licensed surveyors require.

The Board is working closely with Survey and Spatial New Zealand to improve the processes and communication about the competencies required in an undergraduate to meet the Boards standards.

The National School of Surveying at the University of Otago, is the only university in New Zealand that offers a four year degree in surveying. The Board will be working with the School on a review of the curriculum to ensure that the courses offered meet the updated Standards.

RECIPROCITY

Reciprocity between the New Zealand and Australian surveyors' boards has existed in some form since 1892. The Board collaborates closely with the Australian boards on the assessment of other overseas qualifications for equivalence to the New Zealand and Australian degrees and setting policies for the education, training, and regulation of surveyors.

Contact with the Australian States' boards is maintained through the CRSBANZ that comprises of the Chairs of each board. Meetings of the CRSBANZ are generally held once per year, this year two meetings were held.

The activities of CRSBANZ are of significant value to New Zealand surveyors, and promote closer economic relations between Australia and New Zealand.

FINANCE

The Board is funded entirely by licensing fees gathered annually from licenced cadastral surveyors. The level of those fees is set by the Board under section 11(1)(c) of the Act. The Board closely reviews its operating costs and has changed all of its support operations this year to ensure they work efficiently.

The Board contracts accountancy firm Bakertilly Staples Rodway Wellington to maintain its financial position and to prepare tax returns.

The annual Licence fee was maintained at the same level as the previous year.

ADMINISTRATION

The Board has contracted Bakertilly Staples Rodway to provide accounting services, and a meeting room in Wellington.

The membership database, email account and website are hosted and maintained by BC Systems Consultancy Ltd in Mosgiel, Dunedin. The website was upgraded to accept online licence renewals for the first time this year. More improvements to the website are currently under development.

Mr Robert Buchanan of Wellington acts as the Board's legal adviser, and Mr Phil Napper is contracted as the Board Secretary.

The functions and duties of the board, as set out in section 11 of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002 are:

- (a) To maintain a register of cadastral surveyors licensed under this Act.
- (b) To receive applications for licences under this Act as cadastral surveyors and to issue licences in proper cases.
- (c) To set fees for the issue and renewal of licences under this Act.
- (d) To issue and update standards that persons applying for licences, or the renewal of licences, under this Act must meet.
- (e) To investigate complaints about cadastral surveyors and take disciplinary action in appropriate cases under this Act.
- (f) To provide statistical information to the Minister about cadastral surveyors as requested by the Minister.
- (g) To perform such other functions or duties conferred on it by this Act or any other enactment.

Entity's Purpose or Mission

The functions of the Board are set out in section 11 of the Act, the primary function being the licensing of cadastral surveyors competent to conduct cadastral (land title) surveys. The Board consequently sets standards relating to the competencies and practical experience required for the licensing of surveyors. The Board also exercises certain disciplinary powers as set out in Part 4 and Schedule 2 of the Act.

Entity Structure

The membership of the Board consists of:

- (a) 5 members appointed by the Minister in accordance with section 13 of the Act; and
- (b) the Surveyor-General.

Main Sources of the Entity's Cash and Resources

The Board is funded entirely by licensing fees gathered annually from licensed cadastral surveyors. The level of those fees is set by the Board under section 11(1)(c) of the Act.

Main Methods Used by the Entity to Raise Funds

The license fees as set by the Board are invoiced to the members of the body corporate and paid annually.

Opinion



CADASTRAL SURVEYORS LICENSING BOARD OF NEW ZEALAND NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Preparation

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not for Profit) as established by the External Reporting Board for registered charities, on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000.

All transactions are reported using the accrual basis of accounting.

The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate into the foreseeable future.

The performance report is presented in New Zealand dollars. All numbers presented have been rounded to the nearest dollar, unless otherwise stated

(b) Revenue

Annual licence fees for cadastral surveyors are invoiced in April of each year in advance for the following year. Licence fees are recognised as revenue in the period they pertain to. Licence fees received that relate to the following financial year are treated as income in advance.

Interest income is recognised on an accruals basis.

(c) Goods & Services Tax

The entity is GST registered. All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable which are shown inclusive of GST.

(d) Taxation

The Board became a tax paying entity from 1 July 2017. In previous years, Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand was exempt from income tax under the Section CW33 Exemption of the Income Tax Act 2007.

(e) Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank and Cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances.

(f) Property, Plant and Equipment

Depreciation is provided on all property, plant & equipment at rates that will write the cost of the assets to their estimated residual values over their useful lives. Rates are shown as follows.

The entity has the following classes of property, plant & equipment;

Website	50% DV
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All property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation of the property, plant and equipment has been calculated at the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007.

(g) Receivables

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

(h) Investments

Investments held with a registered trading bank are classified as current assets if they have maturities of between 3 months and one year. Those with maturities greater than 12 months after the balance date are classified as non-current assets.

(i) Accounts Payable

Accounts payable are recorded at the amount of cash required to settle those liabilities. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(j) Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes to accounting policies to recognise and measure assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses. All policies have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years'.

2. NATURE AND ACTIVITIES OF THE BOARD

The Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand was established by and operates under the Cadastral Survey Act 2002. This act requires cadastral surveys to be carried out by, or under the direction of, a licensed cadastral surveyor, who must meet the standards for competence and licensing set by the board.

3. ANNUAL CADASTRAL SURVEYORS LICENCE FEES

Cadastral Surveyors Licences expire on 30 June each year. Applications for renewal may be lodged at any time after 1 April for the following twelve month period commencing 1 July.

Annual subscriptions are invoiced in April each year. A number of applications for renewal are received and paid in advance during the period 1 April and 30 June each year. These licence fees received in advance are shown separately on the Statement of Financial Position and are taken up as income in the financial year to which they relate.

4. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

At balance date there are no known contingent liabilities (2018: \$0). The Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand has not granted any securities in respect of liabilities payable by any other party whatsoever.

5. COMMITMENTS

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand had no commitments as at balance date (2018: Nil).
